I recently received a call from a Flagstaff newspaper reporter asking me, "how do you feel about the Humpback Chub"? This was a question way out of the blue. I must admit that I do not spend a lot of time contemplating this indigenous fish to the Colorado river drainage. The Humpback Chub is a member of the minnow family that grows up to 18" in length and prefers deep, fast moving, turbid waters often associated with large boulders and steep cliffs. Its' historic range is the Colorado River system from the Green River in Wyoming to the Gulf of California in Mexico. The Humpback was federally listed as endangered in 1967, four years after the Glen Canyon Dam was built.

Contributing factors believed to have caused the decline in numbers include:

- 1) Lower water temperatures in the river due to upstream dams.
- 2) Clear water has replaced the turbid water of the free flowing river
- 3) Coldwater fish species introduced such as the rainbow and brown trout prey on young Humpback Chubs.

There is a federal plan to save the Humpback Chub from further decline. Some of the activities are listed below:

- 1) Artificial floods to rebuild the beaches and add sediment to the water.
- 2) Removal of trout from above and below the confluence of the Little Colorado. (80 mi. down stream from the dam) These trout are killed, their stomach contents are examined and then they are ground up and given to the Hualapai Indian Tribe for fertilizer.
- 3) Implanting a microchip tag into the Humpbacks so they can be studied when recaptured.

Other ideas that have been put forth by various groups are:

- 1) Removing the Glenn Canyon Dam and letting the river flow free.
- 2) Mixing the water from the bottom of the dam with water closer to the surface to increase the temperature of the water released into the river.

The economy of Page/Marble Canyon and Flagstaff is greatly impacted by the Colorado River and Lake Powell. Lees's Ferry is a world-renowned fishery, which attracts thousands of guests each year and any drastic measure would greatly impact that portion of the state and the water and power users downstream

So it seems the future of Lee's Ferry as a trophy trout fishery may very well be in the recovery of the Humpback Chub. **So, lets hear it for the Chub!**

Tim Gatewood, Fisheries Biologist for the Wildlife & Outdoor Recreation Division of the White Mountain Apache Tribe (WMAT) will be our guest speaker. Tim manages the fisheries program for the WMAT, which includes recreational and native fish. He will bring us up to date on the variety of angling opportunities they offer, a number of the projects they are working on and some of the tribe's management goals.

Many of our club members spend much of their summer in the White Mountains enjoying the numerous fishing venues available on and off the reservation and are aware that some of the best fishing is on the White Mountain Apache Reservation. The WMAT does a terrific job with their fisheries and wildlife management, and some of us have been fortunate enough to enjoy the fruits of their labor.

### **The Flyfisher's Illustrated Dictionary**

by Darrell Martin, The Lyons Press, 2000

by Taff Price, Whitecap Books, 2005

## Travel Healthy

*With our members traveling far and wide in pursuit of fly fishing opportunities, one of our resident docs has put together a series of articles with tips to insure that you’ll feel up to fishing once you arrive- and some advice on what to do if you don’t.*

*Have you experienced headaches, nausea, even vomiting within a day or so of arriving at one of our high-country destinations? You well may be suffering from altitude sickness...*

Altitude sickness is an individual symptomatic response to altitude change and usually affects the susceptible person at about 7000 feet elevation. The possible preventatives:

1. Don’t go there (i.e.: above 7000 feet)
2. Don’t sleep above 7000 feet and if you do, elevate the head of the bed with 3-4 inch blocks to create about a 3% heads-up incline plane.
3. Drink eight 8 ounce glasses of water per 24 hours.
4. Avoid caffeine and alcoholic beverages.

All humans require a time period to adjust to drastic altitude changes and that time period is affected by age and cardio-respiratory conditions of each individual. Medications have been used with limited success to prevent the reaction to drastic altitude changes. You must consult your physician.

Altitude sickness is usually a self-limited experience, lasting one to three days. It is physiologically impossible for low-landers (people living at sea level up to 2000 feet) to fully acclimate in a 2-3 day trip above 7000 feet. The Valley of the Sun is about 1200 to 1400 feet in elevation. To be safe, valley residents with borderline cardio-respiratory reserve should consult their physician before traveling to higher altitudes.

## Fishing Reports:

The San Juan

Tim O'Brien and I took a 3 1/2 day trip to the San Juan in late Sept. Up to this time the largest fish I have seen landed on the San Juan was a 28" monster caught by a guy fishing across from me just above the Upper Flats. That was back around 1993. At about 2 PM on Sept. 23 Tim shattered that record. We were floating with Bear Goode and having a great time landing fish on a #10 dubbed bunny leech with a #18 gray RS2 combo on 4X tippet. We were in the Baetis Bend area when Tim got a good strike followed by a long powerful run. Tim was using his new Sage VPS 5 wt. rod and was not making much progress in getting this fish to the boat. We didn't see it for over 15 min. and without the boat Tim would have lost it in the weeds along the shore several times. That first glimpse showed it was a real monster and was not ready for the net.

After 3 or 4 runs under the boat (Tim putting the rod deep into the water so it wouldn't break off on the bottom of the boat) the fish finally got close enough to net. The total fight was well over 20 minutes and probably close to 30 min. It took Bear several trials to get this luncker into the net but he was successful. By this time we had every boat and wading fisherman in the area shouting at the fight. The fish measured 32" long by 17" at the girth. It took the #18 RS2 and was put back to thrill some other lucky fisherman.

*Did we say it was cold at Hawley Lake last month? Ask anybody who was there what revived our spirits and warmed our bellies after a long day on the water and chances are you'll hear about Jerry's brussel sprouts. You read that right, that funny looking vegetable many of us ordinarily pass over was the star of our Saturday pot-luck.*

*Jerry's a fine fisherman, and a generous cook too. Here's the recipe, straight from the source...*

*There's Reel Lines, fly line, and our favorite, the chow line. This occasional column features member recipes. If you want to know how to reproduce a dish from one of our famed potlucks, give a shout and we'll do our best to net it for you.*

**Jerry McGinness's Brussel Sprout Casserole**

**Ingredients** (serves ten)

4 slices bacon	5 T flour
1 lrg onion	3/4 cup grated parmesan cheese
1 clove garlic (or garlic flakes)	1/2 t salt
2 lbs brussel sprouts (I use Safeway petite)	1/4 t dried thyme
1 1/2 cup milk	1 1/2 cups grated mild cheddar cheese
1 cup chicken stock	paprika for garnish
1/4 cup butter (4 T)	

1. Chop up bacon and crisply cook in a skillet - pour off all but 2 T of the bacon fat and saute the chopped onion and garlic in with the bacon. Spread mixture evenly over the bottom of a casserole dish.
2. Boil brussel sprouts for approx 5 min, drain and spread on top of bacon/onion/garlic mixture. Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
3. Heat milk and chicken broth mixture in microwave or in a sauce pan on the stove top.
4. In a sauce pan, melt butter and mix in flour, cook for 1 min. Whisk in hot milk and chicken broth mixture and cook until thick (approx 5 min). Whisk in parmesan cheese and thyme and pour mixture over the top of the brussel sprouts.
5. Sprinkle grated cheddar cheese evenly on top and sprinkle with paprika (top may also be sprinkled with cracker crumbs).
6. Bake uncovered on center rack for about 30 min.

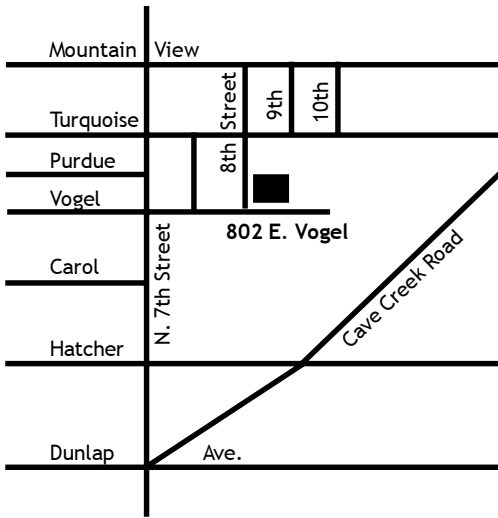
